1. Background

- MEA EWG's work program for 2014-2015 includes a BEREC Report on Oligopoly Analysis and Regulation
- This project requires developing BEREC's own analysis of oligopoly market structures and of the most appropriate manner to deal with them, paving the way for an update of the 2002 SMP Guidelines, providing BEREC feedback in the context of the framework review
- Since the ERG and previously the IRG already worked on this issue from a conceptual point of view and as NRAs were collectively in lack of clear precedent to deal with oligopoly markets:
 - 1. A first step was to **collect information from NRAs' experience** to give the report some substance and to guide our work
 - 2. A second step was to **get input about stakeholders' views on the oligopolies' issue**, through a workshop (held on February, 25th) in order to feed internal debate in BEREC (21 written responses)



General remarks

- Hosted by the Swiss Federal Communications Commission (ComCom) and the Federal Office of Communications (OFCOM/BAKOM/UFCOM).
- Organized with the collaboration of Prof. Bruno Jullien (IDEI) as a moderator and a keynote speaker
- 3 panel discussions, 162 attendants (119 from NRAs, 43 stakeholders), 8
 Panelists (ETNO, ECTA, GSMA, EAFM, DG COMP, ComCom, RTR and Cable Europe)
- General outcome of the workshop:
 - Lively discussion and different views from different type of stakeholders.
 - A lot of concerns about the framework review with current trends;
 - The role of ex ante regulation taken to the core of the debate;
 - Consensus on the target (need for a competitive market, incentives for investments and ROI protection) but, different views on how to obtain it.³

Panel 1: Mergers & acquisitions and trends leading to oligopolistic market structures

- Telecoms markets are oligopolistic in nature due to the characteristics of the market:
 - High investment costs, sunk costs, economies of scale, fast technological progress, high rate of innovation, network externalities and scarcity of spectrum in mobile markets
- Trends of concentration widely observed
- As other drivers of concentrated markets, new sources of pressure which lead to less operators in markets
 - the need for scale to allow for high investments;
 - convergence and the evolution of bundle offers.



Panel 2: Oligopolistic situations and Market analysis

- Oligopolies are not per se harmful, but some markets are more susceptible to uncompetitive outcomes than others
- Uncompetitive outcomes can lead to threats to the interests of end-users (risk of slower innovation, higher prices and lower quality), can increase the likelihood of coordination which could lead to harmful effects, or can raise a potential problem of foreclosure.
- But oligopolies can also bring benefits to market, in terms of incentives for investments and innovation



Panel 3: Oligopolistic situations and relevant ex ante remedies

- No need for new tools, use the existing ex-ante regulation remedies, but in a case by case approach...
 - depending on <u>outcomes</u>: differentiation between non-collusive and coordinated oligopolies
 - ... depending on <u>markets</u>: mobile license may be enough in case of mobile market?
- ETNO: it's time to deregulate, ex ante regulation was meant to be transitional
- ECTA: strong regulation still needed in the fixed market: enduring bottleneck
- EAFM: 'soft regulation' as in "monitoring the market".
- Are ex-post tools sufficient ?
 - Merger control regime considered as adequate





3. Next steps

- Work in progress preparing BEREC Report
 - Under the scope of the Market and Economic Analysis Expert Working Group
 - Input from NRAs
 - Written responses from stakeholders
 - Discussion at the BEREC Workshop on oligopolies
 - Analysis of ex-ante and competition cases as well as EU jurisprudence on joint dominance.
- Draft Report to be approved in BEREC 2nd Plenary (Bergen)
 - Public consultation to be started on June 2015
 - Review based on responses to be received to take place along 2nd half of 2015
- Definitive report to be published in December 2015.
