Henk Don, (ACM, The Netherlands)

Mr. Don worked for the Netherlands Bureau for Economic Policy Analysis (CPB) in The Hague between 1978 and 2006, during which he also worked for the University of Pennsylvania for one year. Until 1984, he was involved in the development of models for the national and global economies. He became a head of sector in 1985, and became deputy director in 1989. From 1994 until 2006, Mr. Don was director of the CPB. Next to his positions at the CPB, Mr. Don was part-time professor in economics at the University of Amsterdam (UvA) between 1990 and 1999. From October 1, 2009, until the launch of the ACM, he was a member of the Board of the NMa.





Maxime Lombardini, Illiad

Maxime Lombardini has been Chief Executive Officer and a director of the Iliad Group since 2007. Before joining Iliad he was with the Bouygues group in which he held successive positions from 1989 as General Secretary of TPS (satellite television), Development Director of TF1 and Chief Executive Officer of TF1 Production. Mr. Lombardini is a graduate of Sciences Po Paris and holds a post-graduate degree in business and tax law from the University of Paris II.



Filipa Santos Carvalho, NOS

Filipa Santos Carvalho has started her career in the Corporate Finance area of BPI (1998). Then, she moved to Optimus (Sonaecom) the same year. In 2003, Filipa Santos Carvalho became the Director of the Legal Department, which, in 2006, merged with the Direction of the Regulation Department. In October 2013, after the end of the merger process of Optimus and Zon, she led the Legal and Regulatory Direction of the new company Nos Comunicações, SA. Filipa Santos Carvalho holds a degree in Law and MBA in Management from Universidade Católica Portuguesa. She is a member of the Bar Association since 1997.

Richard Feasey is an adviser and lecturer. He is an Associate at Frontier Economics in London, Senior Adviser to Wiley Rein LLP in Washington DC and advisory board member at Gigaclear plc. He lectures at Kings College and University College, London and is a Research Fellow at the Centre on Regulation in Europe (CERRE) in Brussels. He was a special adviser to the House of Lords in 2015/6 and Public Policy Director at Vodafone plc between 2001 and 2013.

Sara Andersson, (PTS, Sweden)

Since 2008, Sara Andersson has a position as Director of the Connected Society Department at the Swedish Post and Telecommunications Authority. She has a long experience of working in the telecommunications area, international networking and harmonisation. Sara holds both a Swedish and a French Master Degree in Law (International and European Law).





Kevin Martin, Facebook

Kevin Martin is the Vice-President for Mobile and Global Access Policy at Facebook where he oversees, among others, Facebook's connectivity programs and communication regulatory issues. Previously, he served as Chairman (2005-2009) and Commissioner (2001-2005) of the Federal Communications Commission. During his tenure, the FCC adopted a non-binding policy statement on net neutrality which led to the 2010 Open Internet Order. After leaving the FCC he joined the Aspen Institute as a Senior Fellow at the think tank's Communications and Society Program, and later the law firm Squire Patton Boggs LLP as a Partner. He holds a B.A. from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, an M.P.P. from Duke University, and a J.D. from Harvard Law School.



Michael Bryan-Brown, Liberty Global

Michael Bryan-Brown is Managing Director, Regulation and Competition Policy at Liberty Global, a position he has held since January 2013. Michael is part of the corporate team responsible for developing and implementing Liberty Global's regulatory strategy, public policy and government affairs. Michael joined United Pan-Europe Communications, one of the predecessors of Liberty Global, in 1998 and has held several positions in legal, regulatory affairs and public policy. Michael came to UPC from COLT Telecom Group, where he was Manager, Regulatory Affairs before which he was Regulatory Strategist at Mercury Communications, a Cable & Wireless company, which was the first alternative telecoms operator in the UK. Michael is an Irish solicitor and a member of the English bar. He has an MBA from Warwick Business School and an LLM in IT and Telecoms Law from Strathclyde University.



Guillermo Beltra, BEUC

BEUC represents 41 independent national consumer associations from 31 European countries. Since 2011, Guillermo Beltra has been specifically in charge of BEUC's work related to telecommunications markets and Internet policy issues, including on issues such as net neutrality, roaming, and the Sharing Economy. Before joining BEUC Guillermo was a Public Affairs and Public Relations consultant advising international clients on numerous technology and telecom issues.

Andrus Ansip, Vice-President of the European Commission

Andrus Ansip was appointed Vice-President of the European Commission with responsibility for the Digital Single Market in November 2014. Before moving to Brussels, he was a member of both the Estonian and European Parliaments. This followed almost nine years in Tallinn spent as Estonia's longest-serving Prime Minister, when Ansip worked with both centre-right and centre-left parties to lead three different coalition governments. During his time as Prime Minister, he also acted as chairman of Estonia's liberal Reform Party.
