The BEREC Board of Regulators (BoR) held its 37th ordinary plenary meeting on 6-7 December 2018 in Prague, Czechia.

The meeting was attended by the Heads and/or high-level representatives of the NRAs from each EU Member State which have primary responsibility for overseeing the day-to-day operation of the markets for electronic communications networks and services. Heads and high-level representatives of the NRAs from the EFTA States and the States that are candidates for accession to the EU, the European Commission and the EFTA Surveillance Authority also took part in the meeting.

Information presented	<p>The BEREC Chair recalled the information he had circulated to the BoR on the outcome of the recent important meetings he held and on the meetings that he is going to attend.</p> <p>The BEREC Chair informed the BoR about a meeting he had had with RSPG during the Stakeholder Forum on 17 October 2018 in Brussels.</p> <p>He informed the BoR that he will meet with RSPG on Monday, 10 December 2018 to further discuss cooperation between BEREC and RSPG.</p>

Information presented	<p>The BEREC Office submitted to the BoR for information: the recent and planned electronic voting procedures and the implementation status of the 2018 BEREC Work Programme (WP-2018).</p> <p>A BEREC Office representative also updated the BoR on:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – The expiration of the list contained in the Pool of Rapporteurs and called for nominations from NRAs; – The progress made in the development and implementation of the Net Neutrality (NN) Measurement Tool. He reported that the implementation of the project is on track; – Governance structure for the NN Measurement Tool; – BEREC Annual Reports 2018, for which contributions from EWG Co-Chairs are expected by the end of January 2019; – The operational budget, with emphasis on the spending on meetings and on reimbursement of expenses for EWGs’ experts, use of AVC conference facility, etc.; – The Phase-II cases submitted since the last plenary meeting; – The next sessions of BEREC training. <p>In addition the BEREC Office representative explained the reasons for amending the BoR decision for the procurement of a study on “The Determinants of Investment in Very High Capacity Networks – A System Dynamics Approach”.</p>

Information presented	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> – European Electronic Communications Code & BEREC Regulation <p>The EC representative reported that the Code and BEREC Regulation had been officially adopted, by the EP on 14 November 2018 and by the Council on 4 December 2018.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – Roaming <p>The EC representative reported that the EC will soon publish an interim report on the implementation of the RLAH rules. He emphasised that in general the report states the implementation of the new roaming regulation was successful.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – Termination Rates Recommendation <p>The EC representative reported on the work on the establishment of the Eurorates for fixed and mobile termination rates. He noted that the work on the mobile Eurorate is well advanced. The EC has recently finished the consultation on the cost model, which ran from 29 October to 23 November 2018. The EC representative informed the BoR that a meeting with the Steering Committee is planned to take place on 13 December 2018 to discuss the outcomes of the consultation. He also reported that the next consultation round is planned for February and March 2019. Regarding the fixed termination rates, he informed the BoR about the Workshop on the Assessment of the Costs of Fixed Voice Call Termination Rates, which was held on 23 October 2018, during which the scope and methodology of the cost model had been discussed.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – WACC <p>The EC representative informed the BoR that the consultation on WACC finished on 3 October 2018. He reported that the EC received several responses from NRAs and an input from BEREC. He noted that the main point of controversy is related to the method of calculating one of the parameters of the WACC formula, the risk-free rate (RFR). He reported that the EC is working internally on how to reflect the inputs in the final document. The EC representative informed the BoR that the EC will come back to BEREC at the EWG level to further discuss all the issues in mid-January 2019. He emphasised that the intention is to finalise the work, as initially planned, in the first half of 2019.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – e-Privacy Regulation <p>The EC representative noted that the Austrian presidency tried to overcome the deadlock in the negotiations by moving discussions to the political level (COREPER), but it was not well received by the Member States. He reported that further discussions are necessary. The EC</p>

	<p>representative emphasised his view that any regulation in this area would be better than the current situation. He expressed hope for moving forward with this dossier under the next presidency.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – Cyber Security <p>The EC representative reported that the finalisation of the negotiations on the Cybersecurity Act is planned for next week.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – Platforms to Business Regulation <p>The EC representative informed the BoR that the EP has adopted its negotiation position, which will allow the start of negotiations with the Council in December 2018.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – CEF <p>The EC representative reported that the Council and EP adopted a partial general approach on the Connecting Europe Facility for the next Multi-Annual Financial Framework. He noted that the work is progressing, but the final allocation of funds depends on the final EU budget.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – WiFi for EU <p>The EC representative informed the BoR that the EC had successfully launched a call for projects in November 2018. He reported that more than 2800 municipalities will be awarded with vouchers. He reported that there is a good spread and balance across the EU. He informed the BoR that three more calls will be organised in the next two years.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – NN Evaluation <p>The EC informed the BoR that the EC had a series of exchanges on net neutrality and the Regulation with stakeholders. He noted that the dominant message is not to change the Regulation. However, he reported that the focus will be on BEREC and the update and reflections on the BEREC net neutrality Guidelines in 2019.</p>

Information presented	The objective of this BEREC Opinion is to provide input to the European Commission for its report to the European Parliament and the Council by

	<p>30 April 2019 on the review of Regulation (EU) 2015/2120, based on BEREC's experience with the application of the Regulation and the BEREC Net Neutrality Guidelines.</p> <p>In the draft Opinion, the EWG has evaluated the application of the BEREC Guidelines, with the objective of assessing whether these should be adapted to optimally support the objectives enshrined in the Regulation: protecting end-users' rights and simultaneously guaranteeing the continued functioning of the internet ecosystem as an engine of innovation.</p> <p>The EWG Co-Chairs reported that, in general, the Opinion states that the application of the Regulation and the NN Guidelines works well and that it seems that there is a consensus among NRAs and stakeholders not to reopen discussion on major topics which were agreed in 2016. They noted that, in this context, there is no desire on BEREC's part for the Regulation to be revised. However, some clarification on the application of the Guidelines could be considered. The Opinion suggests to draft an updated version of the Guidelines in 2019 with the involvement of stakeholders via public consultation.</p> <p>The EWG Co-Chairs informed the BoR that the draft Opinion also discusses new technologies and their relationship to the Regulation.</p>

Introduction by	Roaming and Mobile EWG Co-Chair (Arcep)
Information presented	<p>The draft BEREC Report on practices on spectrum authorization and award procedures and on coverage obligations with a view to considering their suitability to 5G compiles an overview of the current practices in the Member States with regard to frequency award procedures and their market-shaping aspects. It also includes information on existing coverage obligations for challenging areas and in general.</p> <p>The EWG Co-Chair reported that the draft report is based on a questionnaire circulated to the NRAs. 28 responses were received and 277 spectrum awards procedures were analysed.</p> <p>The draft report covers topics related to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – Choice and design of awards mechanism; – Competition measures; – Band-bundling and band structure; – Licences’ scope and characteristics; – Coverage obligations; – Future for 5G (trying to identify future spectrum authorisation and award mechanisms, as well as coverage obligations for 5G). <p>The EWG Co-Chair briefly described the sections of the report. He also noted that the most recent version of the document includes comments from RSPG members, following consultation with them.</p>

Conclusions	The BoR approved the document for publication subject to editorial changes.
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10.2. BEREC Common Position on infrastructure sharing

Introduction by	Mobile and Roaming EWG Co-Chair (Arcep)
Information presented	<p>At Plenary 2 2018 in Gdansk-Sopot, the BoR adopted a BEREC Report on mobile infrastructure sharing, which describes the different existing sharing models (passive infrastructure, active infrastructure, frequency sharing, etc.). This report served as an input to the work on the BEREC Common Position on infrastructure sharing.</p> <p>It describes criteria to be taken into account by NRAs in assessing mobile infrastructure sharing agreements, where NRAs have competence to do so. It is intended to provide NRAs, stakeholders and interested parties with information relating to the treatment of such agreements in Europe.</p> <p>The document also provides 'background information' relevant to the consideration of infrastructure sharing agreements. This includes information on relevant legal frameworks applicable to mobile infrastructure sharing, as well as information on the potential benefits and drawbacks of infrastructure sharing agreements. The intention of this section is to provide information on the wider market context.</p> <p>The Common Position consists of:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - A typology of different infrastructure sharing models; - The main objectives to be pursued when considering network sharing agreements; - The parameters to consider when assessing network sharing agreements.
Conclusions	The BoR approved the document for public consultation.

10.3. BEREC Common Position on information to consumers on mobile coverage

Information presented	In 2017 BEREC published a Preliminary Report in view of a Common Position (CP) on monitoring mobile coverage, facilitating a common understanding and fostering a consistent approach on how mobile coverage information can be made available and understandable among NRAs and to the public throughout Europe.

	<p>Building on last year's report, the BEREC EWG continued its work with the aim of establishing a set of future-proof CPs that would establish a common understanding on how mobile coverage is defined, measured and reported.</p> <p>The draft BEREC Common Position on information to consumers on mobile coverage was presented to the BoR. It identified a set of CPs, as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> – CP1: Technical specifications for providing relevant and comparable information on mobile coverage to European consumers – CP2: The use of signal predictions for mobile coverage estimation; – CP3: Ensuring the accuracy of coverage information provided to the public; – CP4: Availability and presentation of mobile coverage information.
Conclusions	The BoR approved the document for publication.

	<p>Based on the inputs received through the public consultation, from stakeholders, NRAs and EWGs (32 institutions), the Incoming BEREC Chair sorted all of the proposed work items according to BEREC's strategic priorities and grouped them into three categories ("Multi-annual / carry over", "Mandatory" and "Discretionary").</p> <p>On 24 May 2018, NRAs were asked to rank their most favoured 15 discretionary items. The outcome of this exercise, together with the draft outline of the BEREC Work Programme 2019, was then presented to the BoR during Plenary 2 2018 in Gdansk-Sopot.</p> <p>After considering all the comments received after Plenary 2 2018 and having consulted with the EWG Co-Chairs, the final draft BEREC Work Programme 2019 was submitted to Plenary 3 2018 for adoption for public consultation.</p> <p>The public consultation on the draft BEREC WP 2019 ran from 10 October until 7 November 2019. The draft BEREC Work Programme 2019 was also presented at the Stakeholder Forum that took place in Brussels on 17 October 2018.</p> <p>The Incoming BEREC Chair reported to the BoR on the outcomes of the public consultation and presented the final draft BEREC Work Programme 2019.</p> <p>He reported that, following suggestions from some NRAs, a feasibility study on the provision of consistent information on pan-European 5G coverage and capability was added to the BEREC WP 2019.</p>
Conclusions	<p>The BoR approved the BEREC WP 2019 for implementation, submission to the European Parliament, the Council of the EU and the European Commission and publication, subject to changes, as suggested.</p> <p>The BoR approved the BEREC report on the outcomes of the public consultation for publication.</p>

Information presented	<p>Article 4 (7) of Regulation No 1211/2009 establishing BEREC and the Office states that “the work of BEREC may be organised into Expert Working Groups”. Article 11.1 of the BoR Rules of Procedure provides that “The Board of Regulators may decide to create Expert Working groups (hereinafter EWGs) to assist with the performance of the tasks and functions of BEREC and request the Office to provide support.”.</p> <p>The current EWGs were established by the decision BoR/2016/04 of 8 December 2016. It was then renewed until 31 December 2018 at the last plenary meeting of 2017 in Copenhagen.</p> <p>The decision BoR/2016/04 (with further amendments) also appointed the EWG Co-Chairs for a two-year period, until 31 December 2018.</p> <p>The current term of office of the EWG expires by the end of 2018. Therefore, there is a need to appoint new EWG Co-Chairs for the following term of two years (in line with the provisions of Article 11.3 of the BoR RoP).</p>
