



### **Inge Bernaerts**

Inge Bernaerts is the Director for Strategy and Policy in the Competition Directorate General of the European Commission since August 2020. Prior to that, she held management positions in the Energy Directorate General of the Commission and was Head of Cabinet to Marianne Thyssen, Commissioner for Employment, Social Affairs, Skills and Labour Mobility in the Juncker Commission. Between 2003 and 2010, Inge worked as case handler in antitrust and state aids and as Assistant to the Directorate General for Competition. Before joining the Commission, she practiced competition law at the Brussels bar with Stibbe Simont Monahan Duhot and Freshfields Bruckhaus Derringer and she lectured European law seminars at the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven. Inge holds a law degree from the Katholieke Universiteit Leuven and a post-graduate degree in European law from the Universität Saarbrücken.



### **Andreas Schwab**

Andreas Schwab is a Member of the European Parliament since 2004. He is part of the European People's Party, member of the Committee on the Internal Market and Consumer Protection, and Rapporteur on the Digital Markets Act at the European Parliament. He studied law at the Albert Ludwig University, Freiburg im Breisgau, gained Political studies certificate at the Institut d'Études Politiques, Paris, and holds LLM Master of Laws degree from the University of Wales.



### **Vanessa Turner**

Vanessa is a Senior Advisor - Competition at The European Consumer Organisation, BEUC which represents 45 independent national consumer associations from 32 European countries. The primary task of BEUC is to act as a strong consumer voice in Brussels and to ensure that consumer interests are given their proper weight in all EU policies. Within BEUC, Vanessa focusses on ensuring that consumer interests are taken into account in European competition policy and key enforcement cases, in particular in Digital Markets. Prior to joining BEUC, Vanessa was a Partner in the Competition Practice of Freshfields and Allen & Overy in Brussels (and also London and Düsseldorf). In between these roles, she was a Member of the Cabinet of the Commissioner for Competition Policy at the European Commission (responsible for mergers and antitrust cases and policy), Special Advisor to the US FTC in Washington DC, and General Counsel, Company Secretary and Executive Vice President at Visa Europe.

Christoph Schmon is the EFF's International Policy Director. Christoph has deep expertise in EU policy-making and a special focus on international copyright law and online intermediary liability.
